This view looks east from Rocky Neck, showing the schooner fleet anchored in the inner harbor with Duncan's Point in the background. So dangerous was the New England fishing trade, that in the 25 years between 1866 and 1890, Gloucester lost 382 schooners and 2,454 fishermen. In 1879 alone, 29 schooners and 249 fishermen were lost—13 ships and 139 men in a single February gale on Georges Bank.
